
## News from The Friends of Kadzinuni

Transforming a community in Kenya Moving Forward, Aiming High

## In April 2021 it was 23 years since we first discovered the village of Kadzinuni, on the coast 40km north of Mombasa in

**Kenya.** What a journey it has been so far! We thought that this would be a good time to reflect financially upon what has been achieved. Since we established The Friends of Kadzinuni in 2003 each year we have raised on average £16,407, including Gift Aid, over £316,000 in total, much from kind and generous people in and around Keyworth. The chart below gives a breakdown of how those funds have been used.



Many people are quite rightly interested to know how much of the donated funds actually goes to charitable projects. We are proud and pleased to be able to show that over 97% of all donations has been spent on projects at Kadzinuni. The majority of our administration expenses have been specifically covered by donations from our trustees with liability Insurance and bank charges for International transfers consuming 1.5%.

In mid-October this year, Covid-19 restrictions permitting, we hope to be able to visit Kadzinuni as we have not been out there since 2012. Then perhaps we'll be able to publish a "before and after" photo journal to demonstrate the transformation that our supporters have made possible.







With government and governing body guidance in place, KCC remain committed to fielding up to 30 teams in 2021 at all levels for Senior Men & Women, Colts, Boys & Girls as well as catering for young beginners (4-7 years), providing opportunities for Disability Cricket, Walking Cricket for Seniors. If you recently moved in to Keyworth or just want to enjoy playing or being involved in cricket and haven't done so for a while, our mantra is always to say 'come along and find your level' – our door is



open to all Male & Female players in the local community and at all levels and ages, so please get in touch.

Senior & Junior cricket will be set up with the following two guidelines: 'Performance', meaning play to win, but not at all costs, maintaining the spirit of cricket and the 'Keyworth Way'. It's that time of year when on the first sign of sunshine you can hear the distant hum of a lawn mower. We are all so eager to get outdoors, tidy up, and take back control of our gardens after endless months of being cooped up indoors.

But can we be too tidy? It's important to remember that your piece of earth also belongs to the wildlife that inhabits it. All the creatures that live alongside us make our garden what it is, from the tiniest organisms in the soil to the birds that we love to watch visiting our bird feeders.

This month we have sought out advice from a local wildlife expert on what we can do to help our wildlife enjoy our gardens as much as we do. Mike Warren is Amanda's neighbour, President of Nottingham Birdwatchers and a member of The Society of Wildlife Artists.

We first spoke about grass and our lawns. We were pleased that Mike is also an advocate of our own ethos, "if a lawn is green, it's okay just leave it". However, he also recommends:

- · Leaving the moss for nesting birds.
- · Leaving longer areas of grass to develop and allowing some lawn weeds to encourage beneficial insects which in turn provide food for the birds.
- Never using chemicals which destroy the biodiversity of the soil

As a life longer member of the RSPB Mike had this advice on feeding our garden birds:

- Mike only provides food in winter saying birds should seek out their own food in summer.
- · If you do feed all year round, do not feed peanuts after April as they may choke young birds.
- Many small birds traditionally forage for wild seeds, so try sowing seed forming flowers in your garden for them.
- Leave seed heads until the following Spring.
- Regularly check the food you provide, making sure it isn't mouldy.
- · Clean and wash bird feeders and tables regularly.
- · Always wash your hands after handling bird feeders and don't bring them into the house to wash.
- Place feeders near to cover to aid quick get away!

Its important to protect our nesting birds at this time of year, so:

- · Try not to trim hedges now until after mid-August and if you have to, use hand trimmers.
- Establish climbing plants for future nesting opportunities
- Plant a mixed hedge instead of fencing
- Plant a tree

In summary, we think its important to embrace nature and allow it to thrive in your garden, and it won't be long before the benefits will be there to see. Don't obsess too much about perfection. This isn't nature's way.

Prune spring flowering shrubs after they have flowered.

Sow vegetable crops outdoors after last frosts.

Make hanging baskets and planters, and plant out summer bedding at end of the month.

Sweet peas should be planted out by now. Seeds may also be direct sown now for a later crop.

Direct sow nasturtiums and marigolds which make good companion plants in the vegetable patch.

Dead head daffodils and tulips leaving the foliage to feed the bulb for next year.

Lift and divide over-crowded daffodils, grape hyacinths, winter aconites.

Sow beans, sweetcorn, cucumber, courgettes, pumpkins and squash under cover

Earth up potatoes



Common blue butterfly is amongst the first non-hibernating butterfly to emerge.

The honey bees start making honey from pollen and nectar collected from flowers.

The red-tailed bumble bee is one of the most widespread species of bumble bee.

Swifts arrive here from Africa in early May and remain for 3 months to breed.

English bluebells flower from mid-April to late May. Wild English bluebells can be found in local woodlands and are lightly scented with a drop like shape and hanging flowers. These should not be confused with the Spanish bluebell which have an upright stem and no scent.

Hares may be seen boxing on farmland.



## Secret Gardener

### **Mission Accomplished**

The biggest difficulty with wildlife-friendly gardening is the neighbourhood cats who regard our plot as an all-you-can-eat buffet with any empty soil being the accompanying toilet facilities. It's their nature but it's not nice and weeding becomes a hazardous, foul-smelling, nauseating affair unless done attentively with a suitable bag to hand to collect any cat poo found in the beds.

A combination of native and other hedging, shrubs and chicken wire has made it near impossible for cats to breech the garden perimeter but seasonal pruning makes the wildlife vulnerable at times as has happened recently. So, having borrowed a pump-action water pistol from a cat-owning friend, and having already noted the times that a particular cat would be seen in our garden, I today lay in wait for it; water pistol armed and ready.



I think I spent nearly two hours sitting very still but the time flew. I discovered that I had a goldcrest visiting the fat ball feeder and a pair of greenfinches, as well as the blue tits, long-tailed tits, great tits, wood pigeons, blackbirds, dunnocks, sparrows, goldfinches, robin and collared doves. Having endured one snow shower and seeing another on approaching, I almost made a move to go but two mice appeared, one only 30 cm from my feet.

Then, the sound I had been waiting for as the cat jumped up onto the fence; eyes darting here and there watching the birds and critters and finally alighting on the mouse near my feet. As it stalked towards the mouse, eyes totally focused on it, my



unseen hand reached for the water pistol. Heart pounding, amazed it had not seen me sitting there I managed only one squirt before it was away and scuttling off over the fence having received hopefully a big surprise. Having identified some minor adjustments only to the hawthorn hedging should be sufficient until it grows back its wildlife protecting verdant spikiness, it was mission accomplished.



## Keyvolution

### The Right to Repair and the Right Plants! Can you help us?

One of the things that's helped me and many others in Lockdown, is BBC's "The Repair Shop" – a gentle and satisfying way to spend an hour, watching people renovate and mend cherished items. It reminds us that older things can still have value, and that a lot of older stuff was literally built to last.

Fortunately, that should also be true of newer things soon, as the UK is falling into line with new EU regulations that give us a "Right to Repair", with new appliances being designed to be mended and manufacturers being required to keep making spares for them for a much longer time. Even without that law, the things we're using in our homes today can often be mended by those with the knowledge and skill to diagnose what the problems are and fix them. Keyworth being the place it is, with so many skilled and talented individuals living here, we suspect that quite a few local people already have some of the skills we need for our own "Repair Shop" project, which we're hoping to start at the Exchanging Rooms in the near future. Please let us know if you're someone who mends things and fancies spending just a few hours doing that or advising others how to do it for themselves. We're aiming to have several repair days a year, but focussing on different things at each one, so it shouldn't mean a big time commitment, especially as we think there are likely to be several experts around for many of the main repairs that people will be wanting.

One thing Keyvolution already has the skills to improve is a garden. At the moment, we're cracking on with the garden space behind the Exchanging Rooms (our base on the Rectory Field, near the Village Hall). The garden space is now cleared and the path has been improved by our team of socially-distanced willing workers. We'll be continuing with that, and also running regular plant and seed swaps and giveaways for a donation each month, so keep an eye out for those on social media and we'll be putting up posters on the Exchanging Rooms noticeboard with the dates too. Feel free to contribute if you have spare plants yourself and we look forward to seeing you soon!

Defibrillators are stored inside a locked cabinet. You will need to call 999 to get an unlock code before you can use it.





#### **Electric Vehicle Charging Points**

Following the installation of a charging station for electric cars in Bunny Lane car park, more charging stations will soon be appearing elsewhere in Keyworth. Between Monday 29 March and 6 April, preparations were made for additional chargers to be installed in Church Drive car park. We are still awaiting a final installation date but once completed, there will be 8 bays with EVC access – 4 of these will be dedicated for EV use and 4 for mixed use.

This fast-charging site works in sync with the rapid site at the Bunny Lane car park, so there will soon be a range of charging options in Keyworth depending on need.



## Wild Things Keyworth

National Hedgehog Awareness week (2nd-8th May 2021) is run annually by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. It also ties in with another wildlife initiative, "No Mow, May". The British conservation charity, Plantlife, encourages us to refrain from mowing our lawns, or



mow 'pathways' instead, which is great for Hedgehogs as they love a mixture of long and short grass.

Hedgehogs also love thick-based hedgerow. They eat insects, beetles, earthworms, anything that creeps and crawls and also carrion (dead animals) such as mice or frogs. Their presence is indicative of a healthy, living garden and you will soon notice bird song and wildlife activity if you add in trees, hedgerow, a wildlife pond with a shoreline and steer clear of the synthetic, concrete and chemical.

Supplementary feeding with kitten/cat/dog biscuits (kibble) and a bowl of fresh clean shallow water can be offered. Hedgehog specific food is available from Petsbits in Keyworth for example, or Brambles and Spikes. Please stick to simple food as described - other foods, like mealworms, pose a severe bone disease risk.

Hedgehogs are 'indicator species'. Their health and abundance 'indicates' how well we are fairing faced with environmental change. Since the wild British hedgehog is on the red list and endangered to extinction within this decade, now is the time to act to turn their fortunes around, and ours.

'Keyworth Hedgehog Highways' ties in to the national 'Hedgehog Highways' campaign by the BHPS and the People's Trust for Endangered Species. All around the country, towns and villages are providing hedgehog infrastructure, garden by garden, neighbour by neighbour (even new housing developments) with a subtle gap in a fence 13cm x 13cm. Hedgehogs can also walk up shallow steps and stairways – each step the height of a brick.








## Keyworth School of Theatre Dance

### (KSTD Established 1976) During The Pandemic

KSTD has continued during the pandemic by teaching their pupils via Zoom. Their 'Timeless' show raised £2,554.00 for Macmillan Cancer Support in March 2020 and it was the last show before Loughborough Town Hall and all theatres had to close their doors. Within a few days of the first Lockdown being announced, KSTD staff and pupils adapted immediately to a new platform that they had not heard of before and started to run a reduced timetable online. More recently KSTD have developed this timetable adding in more classes to meet demand and keep the children entertained and helping them keep well physically and mentally. Although the school will be returning to face- to-face classes after the Easter school holiday, some classes will remain on Zoom to protect the fixed groups the children are in to follow current guidelines. The NEW adult dance fitness class will also remain on zoom until adults are permitted to exercise indoors.

KSTD have taught face-to-face classes for a total of 9 weeks on and off since the first lockdown was announced and were able to run 2 full days of IDTA examinations with external examiners in December 2020 following a strict Covid-19 risk assessment and policy. The pupils achieved merits and distinctions which was particularly outstanding as the preparation had mostly been via remote learning.

To celebrate the success of the Irish River-dancing examination results and, in addition, St Patrick's Day on 17th March, KSTD produced a lockdown video montage of the Irish River-dancing pupils where over 60 pupils performed online. The feedback was fantastic and all pupils and parents enjoyed the opportunity to create a positive memory during such a difficult time.

KSTD, based in Keyworth for 45 years, is now expanding further afield and has new classes starting at Tollerton Methodist Church for pre-schoolers and school aged children in the form of dance clubs on Mondays and Saturdays. The pre-school programme is taught by Kirsty, a licensed Melody Bear® teacher on behalf of KSTD. Contact us to find out if there are new classes starting in your area.

KSTD has an extensive timetable of classes in all genres of theatre dance weekdays and Saturdays at multiple venues in Keyworth and at Tollerton Methodist Church. KSTD encourages children to gain confidence in a nurturing environment and also prepares pupils for IDTA examinations and gives pupils performance opportunities when Covid permits! Over the years, KSTD have performed at venues all over the East Midlands and have raised in excess of £40,000 for many charities. Pupils have gone on to study dance and performing arts at full time dance/drama colleges, university and to have careers in the television and theatre industries. Amongst the team of experienced teachers, 3 are ex-pupils of KSTD. We are also now teaching ex-pupils' children! KSTD was founded by Ann in 1976 and still teaches today.

## Barry's Chinese Pepper Steak & Potato Stir-fry

I'm finding it to be quite an eye-opener researching regional recipes. Lincolnshire is well known as an agricultural county. When driving through the area you see fields upon fields of green vegetables including the staple potato. Popular varieties grown are Maris Piper (roasting and chipping), Marfona (baking and mashing) and Stemster (boiling). This Chinese stir-fry showcases the potato brilliantly. Happy cooking – Barry

400g Maris Piper potatoes, peeled, cooked, cooled and sliced into 2cm discs

#### FOR THE MARINADE

- 1 teaspoon light soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon cornflour
- 1 teaspoon Shaoxing wine or dry sherry 200g thin cut beef steaks, cut into 1cm slices
- FOR THE PEPPER SAUCE
- 2 tablespoons light soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons Shaoxing wine or dry sherry
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon cornflour
- FOR THE VEGETABLES
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped
- 3cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 spring onions, white parts finely chopped, green tops reserved for garnish
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 each of green and red pepper, deseeded and cut into chunks 1 onion, peeled and cut into wedges

In a shallow dish mix the marinade ingredients together. Add the steak, coat gently, then cover and set aside. Combine the ginger, garlic and

spring onion in a bowl and set aside. In a small bowl mix together the pepper sauce ingredients and set aside. Heat 1 tablespoon of vegetable oil in a large saucepan. When very hot, add the steak and sizzle for 30 seconds each side. Remove from pan and put on a plate. Add a dash more oil to the pan, wait until it heats up before adding the potatoes. After about 30 seconds, or when they crisp up, flip them over to crisp the other side. Remove from the pan and place to one side. Add more oil before adding the peppers and onion. After about 3 minutes, when the vegetables have softened, remove from the pan and transfer to another plate. Add the last amount of oil along with the ginger, garlic and spring onion, stir briefly to cook before adding the sauce ingredients (stir before adding so the cornflour is mixed in). As soon as it begins to boil and thicken, tip all the cooked ingredients back into the pan to coat. Serve in bowls and garnish with the chopped green tops of the spring onions. Serves 2 and can easily be doubled.

His route planning was assisted by the American Cycling Club whose advice was invaluable in tackling the infamous Rocky Mountains – note by travelling West to East and not East West, there's a good chance of having the wind at your back.



Prior to taking his flight out to Seattle, Harry's fund-raising efforts had already begun. Using his connections in golf circles Harry and Janet organised charity golf events across the county. He contacted Nottingham Forest, Notts County and local radio for prizes and publicity and received a tremendous response. The local radio stations even checked in weekly on Harry's progress during his journey. His newly found

celebrity status was evident when his plans were announced by the air steward on his outbound flight which was met with cheers and a flood of donations.

From his arrival in Seattle to his departure in New York, Harry experienced the best



of American hospitality. After transferring by bus to begin his trip in earnest at Astoria on the west coast of Oregon, his endeavours took him through numerous small towns and rural ranches. I admire Harry as much for his organisation as his ambition, because for every stop on the way he had organised free accommodation through local organisations

such as the American Chambers of Commerce.

For many of the locals the sight of man on a bike was completely out of the ordinary. Most days someone driving by would pull over and ask what he was up to. Noticing his British accent, the conversation often ended up with an enquiry along the lines of "do you know Princess Diana?". Harry being Harry, he didn't want to disappoint!

Harry even managed to combine his fundraising efforts with his love of golf. In many of the towns, once they knew of Harry's passion for the sport they insisted he play a round. Personally, I'm not sure I'd enjoy or be capable of anything other than eating or sleeping after cycling 80 miles, but Harry assures he won his fair share!

Out of all the interactions on the trip it was Harry's interactions with nature that were the highlights. When he spotted a stream or a scenic area he would stop and pause to take in the wildlife. Elk, moose and the fabled bald-headed eagle where some of amazing creatures he saw on the way – luckily no bears or mountain lions! Unfortunately, it was also nature that cut Harry's trip short in the end, 90% humidity and soaring temperatures

in the Mississippi Basin took its toll and with head overruling his heart, he had to call it day. But with all things considered, with the mileometer on his bike at 2250 – the equivalent of cycling from London to Cairo – Harry can rightly be proud.

Harry is also a keen bird watcher and has a beautiful collection of stuffed birds – all the birds died of natural causes.


